1. Knowledge and Understanding

- > To introduce the students to the basic difference between the Indian and western philosophy.
- ➤ To demonstrate contributions of various philosophers in the early development of the western philosophy.
- > To demonstrate the development of the early Vedic philosophy.
- > To outline the chief characteristics of the different systems in the Indian philosophy with the focus on their differences in the methodologies.
- ➤ To give a complete basic understanding of the epistemology and metaphysics of the Indian philosophy.
- > To understand the distinction between the rationalism, empiricism and criticism in the traditions of western philosophy.
- > To familiarise with the original text of Indian philosophy in the last paper as the optional choice.
- > To create ability and skill to critically examine and analyse the arguments on the basis of knowledge acquired by studying formal logic.
- ➤ To define and elaborate the categorical propositions and their use in deducing validity or invalidity of the conclusion of the set of arguments.
- > To inculcate proficiency in using the inductive and deductive method in logic.
- > To generate interest in the Indian logic by giving a general introduction to the logical theories in the different systems of Indian philosophy.
- > To explain the significance of the moral theories in different Indian and western philosophical systems.

2. Cognitive Skill:-

- > To differentiate between various philosophical theories on the basis of their need and origin.
- > To interpret and explain the importance of a philosophical system on the basis of its contribution to the development of the theories of the subsequent systems.
- ➤ To illustrate the different philosophical theories proposed by early thinkers in western philosophy like Descartes, Spinoza, Leibnitz, Hume, Locke, Berkeley and Kant.
- > To familiarise with various ways to gain and verify knowledge in the Indian philosophical systems.
- > To distinguish between the ultimate end of the various Indian philosophy and comparing the differences between their achievement.
- ➤ To identify the fallacies and the theory of error in Indian philosophy from epistemological and logical point of view.
- ➤ To understand the process of the development of a system from another system, the presuppositions responsible for the arising of new system and how to explain the shortcomings of an existing system.
- ➤ To grasp the basic concept of origin, evolution and development of different moral theories and the background responsible for the development of these theories.
- > To outline the way to read an original text while making its critical analysis simultaneously.
- > To develop the ability to communicate at different levels, ranging from basic to critical communication.

- Ability to identify, speak and write about different philosophical genres, forms, periods and movements in the Indian and Western philosophy.
- ➤ Ability to understand and engage with various critical concepts and categories.
